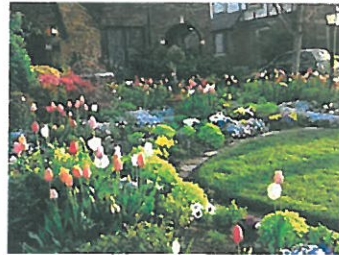

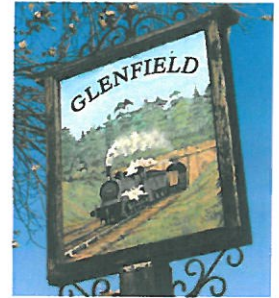
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All Stars Cricket – a word from Anstey & Glenfield Cricket Club

It's a problem that gets on lots of people's nerves - the scourge of dog owners who don't clear up after their pets. So, what can be done to rid streets and parks of their mess?



The signs are easy to spot - the flattened deposit bearing the imprint of a shoe, the anxious parent quickly steering their offspring to one side, the man repeatedly wiping his foot on the verge as if kick-starting a decrepit motorbike. Few things irritate people quite so much as the abandoned deposits produced by the UK's eight million dogs. It is often suggested that between them they produce 1,000 tonnes of the stuff each day. In reality there shouldn't be a problem - you own a dog, it eats, it poos, you clean it up. Failing to do so is anti-social, smelly and can spread diseases, including toxicariasis. Dog mess is one of the most common causes of complaints to local councils and four out of 10 people consider it a problem in their local area, says the campaign group Keep Britain Tidy. Dog owners should clean up after their dog in public places. Always carry a poop scoop, which is a specially designed plastic shovel, or a bag to carry the mess to a bin.

The Parish is particularly concerned about dogs on children's play areas (Ellis Park) and the sports pitches. Under the Anti-social Behaviour, Crime and Policing Act 2014 - any person who permits a dog in their charge to foul any area that has a Dog Control order or Public Space Protection Order (PSPO) enforcement is committing an offence.

What the council can do - If you let your dog foul a public place, the local council can give you an on the spot fine of £80. If you refuse to pay the fine, the council can prosecute you in court for allowing dog fouling. Exemptions apply for people with certain disabilities.
